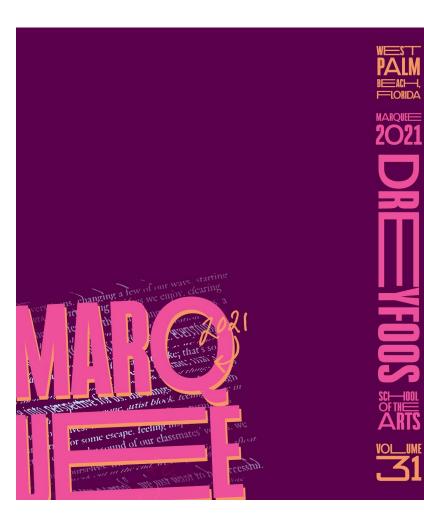
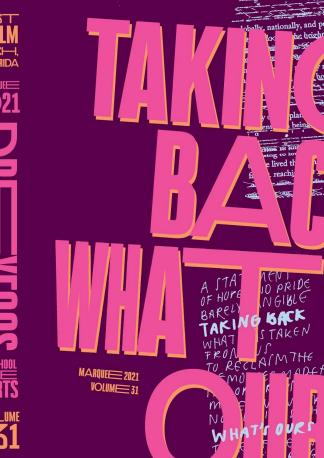

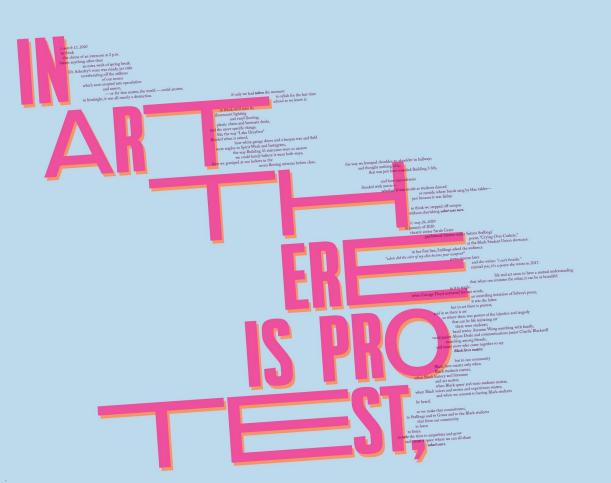

I aimed to convey the message that the voices of the Dreyfoos student body are integral to the message of this yearbook. I wanted the design elements to flow in an organic manner, which shows through the placement and layering of text. A lot of white space is utilized to create breathability.

BLACK LIVES MATTER MOVEMENT SPARKS PROTESTS ACROSS THE NATION

he Black Lives Matter Movement was started by a woman who tweeted it after the death of Trayvon Martin at the hands of George Zimmerman in 2012. The movement regained traction May 25, when Minneapolis Police arrested George Floyd. Floyd was pinned to the ground, unconscious, and later pronounced dead.

"I decided to participate in the Black Lives Matter protest because I felt that my voice needed to be heard," digital media senior Danielle Kiminyo said.

"I SHOULD STAND UP FOR WHAT I BELIEVE IN."

Over the summer, Kiminyo participated in a virtual program called "When We All Vote." It taught young adults and teens about the importance of voting.

"Participating in the program and in Black Lives Matter Protests made me feel more empowered as a Black woman in America," Kiminyo said.

Black Lives Matter protests pushed on and the movement continued to grow.

"Knowing that BLM is trying to bring equity, I like to show my support by protesting," communications junior Alissa Gary said. BLACK LIVES MATTER SPREAD

The black background of the spread contrasts greatly with the white/bright colors that are found on most of the spreads in *Taking Back What's Ours*, communicating the important content and somber mood of this spread. Spot color/black and white treatment is another example of ways that I personalized the design throughout the book, and in this case, it also emphasizes the mood. The other color used is yellow, because yellow and black are the colors used by the Black Lives Matter movement. The headline in the first spread comes from one of the photographs of posters found on the second spread, which tie the two spreads together. The sentiment "we stand with you" is highlighted in the primary headline and pull quote on the second spread.

A: "I personally loved our conversation on the 2020 elections, we had such a good time recording that episode and giving insight into the minds of four teenagers that can't vote. To me, it was one of ou more important conversations. It was a conversation that really signifies the significance of words and how they can really enact so much change."

Q: HOW DO YOU THINK YOU'VE CHANGED FROM THIS EXPERIENCE, AND WHAT DO YOU HOPE THE LISTENERS TAKE AWAY FROM THE EPISODES?

A: "This experience has given me an opportunity not only to be heard, but to listen and understand each other, which is something I think our social and political climate is missing. Being able to focus less on what I am saying and more what others are saying has really changed how I approach my life. communications junior Melodie Barras

Ce was sitting in her living room watching devision with her mother when breaking news unexpectedly flashed on her screen: a report on the death of 46-year-old Black man George Floyd. In response to the events, vocal junior Hunter-Lynn Bhagwandeen decided to use her passion for writing and singing to voice for change.

"The body came and all the other evidence had just come out," Bhagwandeen said. "That graphic video of him screaming, pleading for his life."

"MY HEART SHATTERED. IN THAT MOMENT, I KNEW I NEEDED TO DO SOMETHING. AND THE BEST WAY THAT I KNOW HOW TO DO ANYTHING IS TO WRITE, SO I SAT DOWN ON MY PIANO. I WROTE."

Bhagwandeen wrote and recorded a song, titled "The Voices That Speak for Us." which she later posted to her YouTube channel. She had been writing for her whole life, and began posting her music on public platforms when she was in eighth grade. This song, as Bhagwandeen stated, focused on how younger generations should unite, and "change the systems by becoming a part of them"

"The whole first verse just spilled out of me," Bhagwandeen said. "Like, 'Don't shoot, don't shoot, we're not the enemy. The color of my skin does not define me.' But we need to protest smart. Is violence really getting us anywhere? It's bringing us attention, but at the end of the day, we all need to get smarter. We need to get into these systems to work from the inside out, instead of trying to get people on the inside to look at us." by Emma Kutcher

JUNE DIGEST SPREAD

This spread is a digest spread in the month of June. There is a lot of modular designing that went into this spread, so that each of the mods would be clearly separated, but work together cohesively in the overall design. I was able to fit four mods about student summer activities into one spread. In the design of this spread, I had to adapt, because not many traditional photographs were available. The dominant mod covers speech and debate nationals. The use of tilting shows how this event was altered and interrupted by COVID-19. Black and white treatment signifies speech and debate post-COVID. The design emphasizes intractability; for instance, the QR code can be used by the audience in one mod and adds interactivity the scanned-in lyrics show the student's work that the copy discusses in the other mod.
