Tamala Edwards' first memory of Juneteenth happened in Austin, Texas when she was eight years

Edwards, a 6ABC morning co-anchor, watched her late uncle Albert "Al" Edwards help pass legislation that made Juneteenth an official state holiday in Texas.

The holiday is the oldest celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States.

A civil rights activist, Al Edwards was elected to the Texas State Legislature from Houston's House District 146 at the age of 41. He would serve in the House of Representatives for more than 30 years.

As a legislator, his main goal was to recognize the emancipation of slavery as a holiday. In 1979, he authored and sponsored House Bill 1016, making June 19, also known as Juneteenth, a state-paid holiday in Texas.

The move helped Texas become the first state in the country to make the abolition of slavery an official

## Biden's new ad targets **Trump** felonies

\$50M blitz also spotlights sex assault, fraud verdicts

WASHINGTON — President Joe Biden's reelection campaign is spending \$50 million through the end of June, a blitz that includes its first television ad trumpeting Donald Trump's felony conviction and signals that the Democratic incumbent is seeking to make his Republican opponent's legal woes a bigger issue heading into November.

The advertising push comes with Election Day still months away. But Biden's campaign says it wants to more clearly define the choice between the candidates ahead of the first debate between them in Atlanta on June 27.

The ad campaign includes more than \$1 million geared toward media reaching Black, Hispanic and Asian American voters and a spot highlighting Trump's conviction on 34 felony counts in a New York hush money case. It will air on general market television and connected TV on streaming devices and cellphones in battleground states as well as on national cable.

Besides Trump's criminal conviction, the ad, titled "Character Matters," notes the former president also was found liable for sexual assault and financial fraud

### City extends arbitration award one year with correction officers

Higher raises and a waiving of residency requirements were major parts of the city's extended arbitration award with the city's correctional officers working for the Department of

Mayor Cherelle Parker announced Monday one additional year to the 2022 deal that was set to expire at the end of the month.

When the new fiscal year starts, employees will get a 4.5% raise, up from 3.25% the last two years. The retention bonus goes from \$1,300 to \$1,600, while the new hire bonus jumps from \$2,000 to 20% of the first-year salary, paid out in two installments which will equal around

### Almost 20 years after she found her mother's body, a cold case thaws

NEW YORK — Things were off that morning. Her mother always called out "I love you, baby," before leaving for work; there was only silence. And she always left the bathroom light on; only darkness.

Her childhood rituals disrupted, 12-year-old Brittany Robertson rose from her bed in the living room and opened the door to the only bedroom in their small Bronx apartment.

It was the cold Wednesday before Thanksgiving, 2005. The cooked shrimp and macaroni and cheese for the feast her mother had planned for co-workers was in the kitchen. And in the bedroom, the would-be host, Erica Robertson, 29, was dead on the floor, a knife protruding from her chest, a single glove by her side.

Nearly 20 years ago, I wrote an "About New York" column about the killings of two young women. Both had moved to the city from Columbus, Ohio, and both had been stabbed to death in their apartments. One was Catherine Woods, an aspiring Broadway dancer who moonlighted at topless clubs and whose death on the Upper East Side generated headlines; she was white. The other was Robertson, a securiwhose surname tended to be misspelled as Robinson in the scant news coverage; she was Black.

Within a month, a former boyfriend was arrested — and later convicted – in the murder of Woods. But the unsolved killing of Robertson receded from New York's memory, and from

Until last week, that is, when word came that an ex-boyfriend of Robertson's had been returned from Ohio and charged with killing her. A little-noticed case gone cold had benefited, it seems, from what is often portrayed as the nemesis of police work:

Robertson had surprised her family by moving with her daughter to New York to be with a man from Ohio named James Devore. "It didn't really sit well with anybody," her older brother, Phillip, later said.

The family's misgivings proved pre-motion. But it remained fresh for a with Devore, though she continued to raise a daughter of his. Her own daughter, Brittany, recently said that her childhood impression of him was of a man forever yelling.

"Mean," she said. "Always.'

The weekend before that Thanksgiving, Phillip Robertson, a truck driver, drove 540 miles east, picked up his sister and niece, drove them west for a family wedding in Columbus, then drove them back to the Concourse section of the Bronx, often listening to his sister talking excitedly about the holiday feast she was preparing for her colleagues.

Three days later, Phillip Robertson again drove the 540 miles to the Bronx, his parents and younger brother in tow. They identified the body, collected a shaken Brittany and returned to Columbus, where, in shock, they ate the Thanksgiving food prepared by their beloved Erica.

For Daniel Scanlon, the lead New York police detective investigating the case, Devore was "in the middle of the frame." Several days after the killing, he and his partner tracked down their suspect and interrogated him at police headquarters in Columbus — but not before the detective had the foresight ty guard at a shelter in East Harlem to empty the interview room's wastebasket.

The questioning yielded little. Devore said he was hungry; they nation of investigators, he now faces bought him McDonald's. He said he wanted to smoke; they gave him cigarettes. The interview ended, the suspect left — and the detective collected the cigarette butts from the wastebas-

"I put them in an evidence bag and brought them back," Scanlon recalled. The DNA gleaned from a cigarette butt matched the DNA on the glove at

the scene of the killing, but the Bronx district attornev's office determined there was not yet enough evidence to secure a conviction. "I was very upset, to say the least," Scanlon said.

So began the killing's inexorable relegation from active investigation to cold-case shelving, as that horrible Thanksgiving in the Bronx gradually blurred into Gotham's ceaseless com-

scient. Robertson eventually broke up wounded family in Ohio aching for a resolution that never came.

Erica Robertson's father, Phillip Sr., an equipment operator, died in 2017. Her mother, Sharon, a registered nurse, died in 2022. And her older brother, Phillip Jr., who frequently stayed on a futon in her apartment just to make sure she was all right, died unexpectedly, at 49, in 2019.

As time passed, the forensic use of DNA became more sophisticated. A couple of years ago, the cold-case unit decided to revive the investigation into Erica Robertson's killing, eventually leading to enhanced testing of the victim's nails, which had been clipped and saved.

The DNA material culled from her nails matched the DNA found on the cigarette butt and the single glove. The DNA, prosecutors say, of James Devore, now 54.

He was taken into custody by federal marshals in Ohio in late May. New York detectives from the cold-case unit collected and returned him last week to the Bronx, where he pleaded not guilty to second-degree murder and first-degree manslaughter and was remanded without bail.

The defendant thought he successfully escaped responsibility for this heinous act," said the Bronx district attorney, Darcel D. Clark. "Thanks to the forensic expertise and determi-

Brittany Robertson, whose girlhood ended when she opened that bedroom door, is now 30. She lives in her mother's childhood home in Columbus, where she is raising three children of her own. A fourth child, Elizabeth, was struck and killed while crossing a road to her bus stop; she was 11.

Robertson sobbed as she searched for words that could convey what she felt. Bittersweet relief that justice might be achieved. Gratitude for the New York investigators who persisted. And maybe, even, a certain pride.
"My mother was a fighter," she said,

referring to the DNA found in her nails. "She basically solved her own case."

### He was 'Mr. X' before a true crime podcast stirred investigators

For nearly 50 years, a man whose body was found County, South Carolina, murder victim of the year. was known only as Mr. X, but law enforcement offithe remains. The case was revived after investigators were inspired by a local true crime podcast.

He was Oscar James Nedd, a young man who had moved from his small hometown in Georgia to White Plains, New York, for college, in the hopes of becoming a journalist.

"Murder, etc.," the podcast that brought new attention to the case, was not focused on the unsolved killing and unidentified body but mentioned the cold case briefly in one of its more than two dozen episodes. Still, Sheriff Hobart Lewis of Greenville County said at a news conference Monday that the true crime series prompted his office to reexamine the case.

Lewis said that Nedd, who would have been 23 around the time of his death, was a murder victim.

"It is believed that Oscar was killed in New York and tal remains for DNA testing. ultimately brought to South A profile was also created in Carolina for reasons we do not know." Lewis said.

The death will now be investigated in New York.

Brad Willis, the producer and host of "Murder, etc.," said that it was gratifying for him and his researcher, Andy Ethridge, to learn that Nedd's family came to know where he had been for the last 50 years.

It was also a huge surprise. The podcast's last episode was released in February 2020, and it was not about the cold case. Instead, it investigated the murders of Frank Looper, a police officer, and his son, Rufus, also in 1975. Some of their family members and former co-workers have shared doubts that the man convicted of the murders, Charles Wakefield, is responsible for the deaths, and key pieces of evidence have since been questioned. Wakefield is pursuing a new trial.

Lewis said that the initial investigation of Mr. X's death began Jan. 4, 1975, after a hunter found the body. It was wrapped in a sheet and was smoldering, indicating it had been set on fire, the sheriff said. The coroner's office ruled the death a homicide by blunt-force trauma and strangulation.

Authorities in Greenville County exhumed the body in July 2020 and sent the skelethe National Unidentified and Missing Persons System, a database of missing- and unidentified-person cases that is accessible to investigators across the country.


The weather was perfect for thousands to attend this year's Juneteenth parade on 52nd Street in West Philadelphia. The annual event, which ended at Malcolm X Park, is one of the largest of its kind in the U.S.



### How a Philadelphia Non-Profit is Helping to Preserve Affordable Housing with TD

Everyone deserves a safe and affordable place to live but with the current nationwide housing crisis, there are fewer options available.

Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) Philadelphia is aiming to help change that in the city with its Non-profit Preservation Initiative, which aims to fund non-profit building owners and developers to preserve and protect publicly assisted affordable rental housing units in Philadelphia neighborhoods.

This initiative also includes working with residents and community organizations to create communities where people can live, work, visit, play and raise families, according to Andrew Frishkoff, Executive Director of LISC Philadelphia.

The program's goal is to help preserve 1,500 units of affordable housing in the next two years. Last year, the TD Social Impact Investment Council announced its contribution of \$2.5 million over two years for the initiative to assist LISC's work.

"TD was the first to say yes, we are fully behind supporting this issue, and their support has been huge even in year one," Frishkoff said.

"TD has roots in metro Philadelphia and with that comes the responsibility to serve all communities here," said Rob Curley, Regional President of Metro Pennsylvania/New Jersey, TD Bank. "By making tangible increases in resources and economic opportunities in Philadelphia, diverse and underserved individuals and families can realize their full potential and have the same financial security as their neighbors."

Frishkoff noted in the first year, the initiative has worked with nine non-profit organizations to preserve 712 units of affordable housing, exceeding LISC's own expectations. The organization has also provided workforce training.

## Surgeon general wants warnings on social media

U.S. Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy announced Monday that he would push for a warning label on social media platforms advising parents that using the platforms might damage adolescents' mental health.

Warning labels — like those that appear on tobacco and alcohol products — are one of the most powerful tools available to the nation's top health official, but Murthy cannot unilaterally require them; the action requires approval

The proposal builds on several years of escalating warnings from the surgeon general. In a May 2023 advisory, he recommended that parents immediately set limits on phone use, and urged Congress to swiftly develop health and safety standards for technology platforms.

He also called on tech companies to make changes: to share internal data on the health impact of their prod-

features such as push notifications, autoplay and infinite scroll, which he says "prey on developing brains and contribute to excessive use."

In an interview, Murthy said he had been deeply frustrated by the platforms' reluctance to do so.

"I don't think we can solely rely on the hope that the platforms can fix this problem on their own," he said. "They've had 20 years."

He said that he was "quite optimistic" that legislators will put forward a bill requiring a warning label, which he envisioned would appear regularly on screens when people use social media sites.

The push for a warning label sets up a battle between the Biden administration and the tech industry, which has sued several states over laws on social media.

Technology companies are likely to argue that the science on the harmful effects of social media is not settled. They will also invoke free speech law, arguing that the government cannot force ucts; to allow independent companies to carry a product safety audits; and restrict warning, which is sometimes

### Man plotted mass shooting in Atlanta to incite 'race war,' officials say

An Arizona man who planned to commit a mass shooting at an Atlanta rap concert as a way of inciting a "race war" has been indicted by a federal grand jury on hate crime and firearm charges.

The man, Mark Adams Prieto, hatched a plan in several discussions with two people working with the FBI who posed as racist extremists to carry out a mass shooting targeting Black people and other people of color at a concert in Atlanta on May 14 and May 15, the Justice Department said on Tuesday.

Prieto, 58, was reported to the authorities last year by an acquaintance who said he had made concerning comments calling for mass shootings targeting Black people and others, according to officials.

Prieto faces two counts of trafficking in firearms, one

count of transfer of a firearm for use in a hate crime and one count of possessing an unregistered firearm.

He faces a maximum 15-year prison sentence for each firearm trafficking and transfer charge and a maximum 10-year sentence for the unregistered firearm charge, prosecutors said. Prieto also could be fined \$250,000 for each count.

A lawyer for Prieto was not listed in a court database as of Saturday evening.

Officials stopped and arrested Prieto, of Prescott, Arizona, near Interstate 40 in New Mexico on May 14. according to prosecutors.

He had seven firearms in Prieto intended for the his vehicle, and investigators carrying out a search warrant would later find an arsenal of guns in his home, including an unregistered short-barreled rifle and AR-15 and AK-47-style rifles, according to the indictment.

Officials were tipped off about Prieto in October by a man who had known and frequently chatted with him at gun shows, according to an affidavit filed in court.

### Over 70M people in the U.S. are under heat alerts

PHOENIX — More than 70 million people in the United States were under extreme heat alerts Monday as a heat wave moved eastward, and the mid-Atlantic and New England were likely to see highs in the 90s as the week progresses.

The heat has been especially dangerous in recent years in Phoenix, where temperatures hit 112 degrees Fahrenheit on Saturday. Weather service forecasters say the first two weeks of June in Phoenix have been an average of 5.6 degrees Fahrenheit hotter than normal — the hottest start to June on record there.

A meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Phoenix, Ted Whittock, advised reducing time outdoors between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m., staying hydrated and wearing light, looser fitting clothing. More than 100 cooling centers were open in the city and surrounding county, including two new overnight

In neighboring New Mexico, heat on the Chaves County plains including Roswell was expected to hit 107 degrees F (41.6 Celsius) on Monday. In southern Colorado, temperatures were expected to surpass 100 degrees (37.7 Celsius).

In Southern California, firefighters increased their containment of a large wildfire in mountains north of Los Angeles on Monday after a weekend of explosive, wind-driven growth along

### At least 9 shot at splash park in Michigan

A gunman opened fire at a Michigan splash park Saturday in what authorities said was a random attack that left at least nine people, including a child, wounded, police said. The shooting occurred at Brooklands Plaza Splash Pad in Rochester Hills, Michigan, a Detroit suburb, authorities said. Officers were called to the scene just after 5 p.m.

A Glock 9 mm handgun and three empty magazines were recovered at the scene, the sheriff said, adding that the gunman fired up to 28 times.

Officials said they believed that they had the gunman "contained" inside a nearby home.

### Opal Lee receives keys to historic Texas home

FORT WORTH, Texas — Opal Lee, the 97-year-old Texan known for her push to make Juneteenth a national holiday, was given the keys Friday to her new home, which was built on the same tree-lined corner lot in Fort Worth that her family was driven from by a racist mob when she

"I'm so happy I don't know what to do," said Lee, sitting in a rocking chair on the porch of the home just before the ceremo-

The ceremony to welcome Lee into the newly completed home comes just days before the nation celebrates Juneteenth, the holiday marking the end of slavery across the U.S. that means so much to Lee. Several area groups came together to build and furnish the house, which was completed less than three months after the first wall was raised.

Lee said she plans to hold an open house so she can meet her new neighbors.

'Everybody will know that this is going to be a happy place," she said.

This June 19 — Juneteenth — will be the 85th anniversary of the day a mob, angered that a Black family had moved in, began gathering outside the home her parents had just bought. As the crowd grew, her parents sent her and her siblings to a friend's house several blocks away and then eventually left themselves.

Newspaper articles at the time said the mob that grew to about 500 people broke windows in the house and dragged furniture out into the street and smashed it. She has said her family didn't return to the house and her parents never talked about what happened that day. Instead, they just went to work in order to buy another home.

Lee has said it wasn't something she dwelled on either, but in recent years she began thinking of trying to get the lot back. After learning that Trinity Habitat for Humanity had bought the land, Lee called its CEO and her longtime friend, Gage Yager.

Yager has said it was not until that call several years ago when Lee asked if she could buy the lot that he learned the story of what happened to her family on June 19, 1939. The lot was sold to her for \$10.

# Maryland Gov. Wes Moore pardons over 175,000 marijuana convictions

ANNAPOLIS, Md. — Maryland Gov. Wes Moore ordered more than 175,000 pardons for marijuana convictions on Monday, saying the "most sweeping state-level pardon in any state" will help reverse harms from the past caused by the war on

During a news conference, Moore said the executive order will affect "tens of thousands of Marylanders" convicted of misdemeanors. Some may have had more than one conviction pardoned through the

"We are taking actions that are intentional, that are sweeping and unapologetic, and this is the largest such action in our

nation's history," Moore, a Democrat, said. Though the pardons will not result in anyone being released from incarceration and nor will they result in having past convictions automatically expunged from a person's background check — advocates praised the move as a way of removing barriers to housing, employment, or educational opportunities based on convictions for conduct that is no longer illegal.

Heather Warnken, executive director of the University of Baltimore School of Law Center for Criminal Justice Reform. described the pardons as "a win for thousands of Marylanders getting a fresh start to pursue education, employment, and other forms of economic opportunity without the stain of a criminal conviction."

Recreational cannabis was legalized in Marvland in 2023 after voters approved a constitutional amendment in 2022 with 67% of the vote. Maryland decriminalized possession of personal use amounts of cannabis on Jan. 1, 2023. Now, 24 states and the District of Columbia have legalized recreational cannabis.

"This is about changing how both government and society view those who have been walled off from opportunity because of broken and uneven policies," Moore said.

Moore said "legalization does not turn back the clock on decades of harm that was caused by this war on drugs."

He continued: "It doesn't erase the fact that Black Marylanders were three times more likely to be arrested for cannabis than white Marylanders before legalization. It doesn't erase the fact that having a conviction on your record means a harder time

A pardon is different from an expungement. Although the Judiciary will make a note on the record that the offense has been pardoned, it will still show on the record. Expungement is the process by which a criminal conviction is destroyed and removed completely from the public record, which requires an additional step.

# An innocent life lost in a D.C. carjacking

I care less that D.C. carjackings are significantly down in the first half of 2024 compared with a year ago because I'm so sickened by what happened to Leslie Marie Gaines. She was the 55-year-old victim of an unarmed carjacking at the MedStar Washington Hospital Center on Monday after-

It's one of those events that stops you in your tracks.

Gaines's day began at the hospital's rehab facility on nearby Irving Street NW, where she went for physical therapy at approximately 11:15 a.m. It ended at George Washington University Hospital, where she was pronounced dead at 2:38 p.m.

What happened in between leaves me frustrated and mad as hell because the true justice that her family wants for her is impossible. That is, if justice also means showing mercy and compassion to one another. Were a sliver of that present on Monday, Gaines would be alive today.

Court documents detail some of the key events in this case. The documents also point to reasons D.C. police charged Kayla Kenisha Brown, 22, in connection with Gaines's death.

Where was mercy for Gaines on that day?

According to the court records, Gaines and her daughter pulled up to Med-Star's emergency room entrance because Gaines wasn't feeling well following her physical therapy. Gaines's daughter went inside to seek wheelchair assistance for her mother, who remained in the car with the engine running, the documents say. But when the daughter returned to the entrance, both the car and her mother were missing.

A D.C. police news release reported that at about 1:11 p.m., Brown walked away from her family at MedStar just as Gaines and her daughter were pulling up. After Gaines's daughter went inside for the wheelchair, police report, Brown entered the driver's seat and drove away with Gaines inside the car.

Where was compassion for an ailing mother?



Documents tell us how it ended. The car, with Brown at the

wheel and Gaines in the passenger seat, was observed traveling at high speed when it failed to negotiate a turn at Sixth and D streets NW and collided with a barrier outside the office of the U.S. attorney. Keys in hand. Brown tried to flee on foot and was caught by the police, while Gaines was found unconscious in the front passenger seat. Police provided first aid until emergency medical services arrived to transport her to George Washington University Hospital.

How did Gaines and Brown end up crossing paths? The answer gets at an important part of this story.

This account is also drawn from court documents: Around the time Gaines and her daughter were arriving at the rehab center, police were responding to a 911 call from a woman screaming and asking for help before the line disconnected. Police and emergency medical technicians went to the apartment that the call was made from, where they were met by Brown and her mother. Brown stared at them but didn't respond to their ques-

Brown's mother said that her daughter, as summarized by court documents, had gone out and gotten some sort of drug while out with a man she met on Instagram." Brown's father indicated "she had been acting crazy for about three days," court documents state.

Emergency medical technicians found that Brown's blood pressure and heart rate were too high for her age and transported her by ambulance to MedStar, where she arrived 12:40 p.m.

After determining that Brown was not a crime victim, the police left the emergency room around 12:46 p.m. That's where D.C., sometimes about politics Brown remained until she — for The Washington Post.

Instead, I'll think of Gaines strapped in her daughter's car. Think of the shoplifting, car thefts, robberies and turf wars plaguing our streets, all fueled by drug-seeking.

Mercy demands we think of all that, not just the dealer and the users. # Curtailing syringe exchange services will fuel HIV

The recently passed Philadelphia budget that removes funding for syringes in the life-saving needle exchange services is a misguided step that will harm not just people who inject drugs but the broader Philadelphia population as well. We are not sure that this fact is widely appreciated in the discussion over syringe exchange funding. Syringe exchange has prevented thousands of Philadelphians from acquiring HIV and developing AIDS — and not just among people who inject drugs!

It is rare that there is a simple, low-cost method that prevents a complex, high-cost and deadly outcome, but this is one of the clearest examples. The effectiveness of syringe exchange is not hypothetical but fact, with research studies uniformly showing large decreases in new infections. Syringe exchange programs reduce new HIV infections by oneto two-thirds. Syringe exchange also reduces transmission of another deadly virus, hepatitis C (HCV), to half or one-quarter of what otherwise would be.

The syringe exchange introduced in Philadelphia in 1992 led to a dramatic drop in new HIV infections. But people who inject try. tion drugs — while saving money and lives in the city.

Finally, it is sometimes claimed that syringe exchange draws people who inject drugs to locations where it is available. But people who inject drugs are drawn to these neighborhoods because that's where the drugs are. Curtailing syringe exchange will not impact injection drug use in those areas, it will just increase HIV and HCV infections and increase transmission into the broader community.

The city is harmed in so many ways by the injection drug use crisis, and especially so for the neighborhoods that are so terribly vative approaches to combat the

neighborhoods more livable. However, the decision to pull funding for syringe exchange services will undercut a tremendously medically effective and cost-effective prevention strategy.

While it is claimed that syringes can be obtained through other sources (like charities), that will not be sufficient. Just as importantly, the policy sends the message that this effective prevention strategy is not a Philadelphia priority and will inevitably lead to tragic and costly spikes in HIV and HCV in the broader Philadelphia community. All this disproportionately affects people of color in our community, exacerbating Philadelphia's already deep health inequities.

We are both physicians and HIV/AIDS researchers. The purpose of research is to figure out what works and what does not. The powerful facts here show that syringe exchange reduces HIV and other deadly diseases, without exacerbating drug use. The facts also show that a resurgence of HIV among people who inject drugs will penetrate the broader Philadelphia community. Full funding and support for sustaining syringe exchange services is essential to protect the health of all of Philadelphia, in tandem with strong and effective approaches to increase public safety and curtail the underlying drug use epidemic.

5. Think harm reduction, not elimination. In the food environment we live in, it would take an enormous investment of time and resources to completely avoid ultra-processed food. This is not realistic. Instead, we should aim for harm reduction.

That means being aware of our choices and cutting down on unhealthy substances where we can. Sometimes, victory is simply choosing the less bad option. Research demonstrates that the more ultra-processed food someone eats, the worse off they are, so every bit of reduction counts.

At the end of the day, what we should all advocate for are policy changes that stop incentivizing manufacturers to produce ultra-processed food. It is infuriating as well as alarming that the U.S. Senate on June 5 failed to pass the Right to Contraception Act, a straightforward bill that would guarantee a federal right to safe and legal contraception.







You can reduce your risk of an early death for any reason by nearly 20%, just by eating more foods from your choice of four healthy eating patterns, according to a new study.

People who more carefully followed any of the healthy eating patterns which all share a focus on consuming more whole grains, fruits, vegetables, nuts and legumes — were also less likely to die from cancer, cardiovascular illness, and respiratory and neurodegenerative disease.

## Common low-calorie sweetener linked to heart attack and stroke

A low-calorie sweetener called xylitol used in many reduced-sugar foods and consumer products such as gum and toothpaste may be linked to nearly twice the risk of heart attacks, stroke and death in people who consume the highest levels of the sweetener, a new study found.

"We gave healthy volunteers a typical drink with xylitol to see how high the levels would get and they went up 1,000-fold," said senior study author Dr. Stanley Hazen, director of the Center for Cardiovascular Diagnostics and Prevention at the Cleveland Clinic Lerner Research Institute.

"When you eat sugar, your glucose level may go up 10% or 20% but it doesn't go up a 1,000-fold," said Hazen, who also directs the Cleveland Clinic's Center for Microbiome and Human Health.

"Humankind has not experienced levels of xylitol this high except within the last couple of decades when we began ingesting completely contrived and sugar-substituted processed foods," he added.

### Worrisome blood clots occur

## How internet addiction may affect your teen's brain

Teens who spend lots of time on social media have complained of feeling like they can't pay attention to more important things like homework or time with loved ones.

A new study has possibly captured that objectively, finding that for teens diagnosed with internet addiction, signaling between brain regions important for controlling attention, working memory and more was disrupted.

The findings are from a review, published recently in the journal PLOS Mental Health, of 12 neuroimaging studies of a few hundred adolescents ages 10 to 19 between 2013 and 2022.

The criteria for clinical diagnosis of internet addiction in the included studies were "one's persistent preoccupation with the internet, withdrawal symptoms when away from the internet, and sacrificing relationships (for) time to spend on the internet over an extended period of time (e.g., 12 months)," said Max Chang, first author of the study and outreach case manager at the nonprofit Peninsula Family Service in San Francisco, via email. "The pattern of behaviour results in significant impairment or distress in the individual's life."

"Cause and effect cannot be drawn from these studies," said Ellis, who wasn't involved in the study. "Second, the focus on functional connectivity comes at the expense of any critique about the key meadiagnosed with internet addiction sure of interest. "Today, the conceptualization and measurement of internet 'addiction' is neither universally accepted and certainly not diagnosable using the survey instruments used in the studies included as part of the review," Ellis added. In the United States, internet addiction isn't included in the DSM-V — the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders, the standard classification of mental disorders used by mental health professionals in the US. It does, however, list internet gaming disorder. All the studies the authors reviewed were all conducted in Asia and consisted of mostly male participants. China was the first country to declare internet addiction a "public health crisis."

'Such definitions, despite being widely critiqued, also have a tendency to move the focus away from genuine online harm and towards a conclusion that suggests the removal of technology from people's lives will be helpful," Ellis said. "Solid evidence to suggest that removing the internet brings any tangible benefits has not been forthcoming."

Das wasn't involved in the study.

The functional connectivity patterns in participants' brains are, in fact, in line with those observed in people with substance addictions, said Dr. Caglar Yildirim, an associate teaching professor of computer science at the Khoury College of Computer Sciences at Northeastern University in Boston. Yildirim wasn't involved in the study.

"Overall, the mechanisms underlying internet addiction are more like an emerging pattern than a finished picture," Chang said. "A lot of causality between what happens in the brain and what is displayed through behavior is still being understood. As of now, observation using biomarkers such as functional connectivity helps bridge that gap."

If you're wondering if your teen struggles with internet addiction, behaviors such as withdrawing from relationships are a telltale sign, Chang said.

own reasons for wanting change. In severe cases, a psychiatrist may suggest medication to treat certain types of technology addiction, she

'In addition to treating the internet addiction, there may be other underlying mental health conditions that should also be given attention," Das said. "Finally, some of the preventative measures that we recommended include to limit screen time and take breaks and avoid doom scrolling.

Technology addictions have become prevalent enough for the American Psychiatric Association to include it as a topic in its presidential initiative for 2023 to 2024, said Das, immediate past-chair of the APA's council on addictions.

"Because we know families are desperate for help and confused about the science," Das said, "we developed several resources, many of which are on the APA website."



# REFLECTING ON THE PHILLY ROOTS OF BLACK MUSIC MONTH

As one of the greatest music cities in the country, The City of Brotherly Love and Sisterly Affection was instrumental in the launch of the annual celebration.

June 7 marks the 45th Anniversary of Black Music Month. First officially recognized by President Jimmy Carter in 1979, the month honors the significant contributions of Black musicians in numerous genres and how that influence is one of the country's greatest creations and exports.

The first celebration was held on the South Lawn of the White House and featured performances by Chuck Berry and Billy Eck-

The month has had several names including National Black Month in 2009 by President Barack Obama. He noted that Black artists have created music "to dance, a roster that included The O'Jays, to express our faith through song, to march against injustice, and to defend our country's endearing promise of freedom and opportuni-

While the contributions of Black Philadelphia artists have been well documented, the story of Philly's crucial role in creating and celebrating Black Music Month since it started in 1979 may be less well known.

Here's a look at the history of efforts in Philly to create Black Music Month:

#### Philly legend Kenny Gamble co-founds Black Music Month

The name Kenny Gamble is synonymous with musical excellence, so it is completely on brand for Gamble to help lead the way in co-founding Black Music Month along with his former partner, media trailblazer Dyana Williams, and pioneering and merchandising, record compalabel executive Ed Wright.

Alongside songwriting partner Leon Huff and their longtime collaborator Thom Bell, Gamble founded Philadelphia International Records in 1971, which gave the world TSOP: more than anything else," Kenny The Sound of Philadelphia. The label would go on to be one the most suc-

After witnessing the work of the Country Music Month while on a trip to Nashville, Gamble was convinced that Black artists need something similar. Shortly thereafter, Gamble and met Wright at a National Association of Television and Radio Announcers (NATRA) convention, after which they would go on to establish the Black Music Association.

In September 1978, the BMA officially launched in La Costa, California. Music industry heavyweights like Berry Gordy, Dick Griffey, Don Cornelius, Stevie Wonder, Smokey Robinson, and Rev. Jesse Jackson, were all in attendance at the history-making event.

Originally, the BMA had four divisions which were marketing ny executives, TV and radio on-air talent (including DJs and journalists), and the artists themselves.

"Initially, Black Music Month started as an economic program Gamble said in an interview with Music Quarterly. "The CMA had cessful labels of the 70s boasting worked to establish October as

Country Music Month, so we picked June as a time where we could concentrate on recognizing and celebrating the economic and cultural power of Black music and those who made and promoted it. The slogan we came up with was, 'Black Music Is Green' - it was about economics. So, in an effort to galvanize, as well as create an advocacy entity, Black Music Month was born."

#### Dyana Williams' nearly decade-long lobbying effort

Although she was born and raised in Harlem, "The Godmother of Black Music Month" Dyana Williams is definitely at least an honorary Philadelphian after more than four decades of being connected to the city. As a Black Music Month co-founder, Williams hosted celebrations and events to honor the month through the 80s. She was stunned to discover that President Carter never signed the official proclamation for Black Music Month to be recognized by the federal government as an annual celebration.While producing a Black Music Month celebration in the 90s, she wrote to then-President Bill Clinton, calling for the White House to host an event when she learned of

Carter's oversight. The White House said, 'Well, we see that President Carter hosted the Black Music Association. We know that you were his guests. But he unintentionally did not write a presidential proclamation, which would've meant that every president following him would have done similarly," Williams said in an interview

Washington went on to share with the audience the details of his Saturday routine in preparation for the eventful festivities.


According to Washington, having God as a foundation in his life has helped him deal with life's complexities. "Inner peace is the word of the day. I read the daily word every day."



(At a recent gathering honoring retirees, the second violin section of the NSO pitched in \$1,000 toward the scholarship.)

NSO principal second violin Marissa Regni sees the Temple scholarship as a natural extension of a generosity of spirit that extends beyond the orchestra.

"I think it's so amazing that he did this, but I'm not at all surprised," she said. "Desi is incredibly generous, especially when it comes to the promotion of young people and supporting their goals."

"Not to sound boring," Alston says, "but my main precept in life is what we do for ourselves dies with us, what we do for others lives on forever. I don't know who wrote that, but that's how I live my life. A lot people helped me, and I needed every penny. I wanted to pay it back. I want to give tribute to my teacher. How lucky I was to have him involved in my life."

On tour in Europe with the NSO this past February, the professional affection and musical admiration earned by Alston among his cohort was clear at every stop. Entire logistical plans were constructed with consideration of his abiding aversion to texts, emails, smartphones and technology in general. (Alston is additionally not thrilled about the unreliable fiber-optic cables that have sullied his home landline.)

"Maybe I'll come out of the dark ages in the future," he tells me. "But for now, I'm blissfully happy with the way my life is."

That trend is likely to continue as Alston relocates to Hawaii, where he's had a place since 2000. His hope is that the finish line of retirement will deliver the same rush of joy, accomplishment and catharsis as a good run.

"I'm profoundly grateful for the myriad memories of world travel, wonderful music making and the cherished friendships spawned along the way," he says. "I've had a good ride, but now it's off to my idée fixe, my soif de vivre."



### GOSPEL GROUP, BASKING IN RESURGENCE, **RELEASES FIRST NEW MUSIC IN NEARLY 50 YEARS**

She made a single gospel soul record in the 1970s with her brothers, when they were all teenagers. Then Annie Brown Caldwell moved on with her life.

Decades later, she was running a clothing store in a tiny Mississippi town and singing on weekends with her husband and children when she got a call from a label founded by David Byrne. They wanted to add a single from her first band, the Staples Jr. Singers, to a compilation record.

That 2019 call led to more the Luaka Bop label reissued the band's 1975 record "When Do We Get Paid," drawing rave reviews in 2022 for its raw sound and mix of blues, funk and soul. And soon the Brown siblings, now in their 60s, found themselves on a course that would make any rising pop star jealous.

In the past four years, they flew for the first time, toured Europe four times and played hipster clubs like Brooklyn's Baby's All Right. And, finally last year, they saw a performance by Mavis Staples, whose group The Staple Singers inspired their own early sound with genre-busting, socially conscious Stax Records hits. Also a band of siblings, they had covered several of their songs.

said Brown Caldwell, who was 11 when she and R.C. and Edward, who were 12 and 13. co-founded The Staples Jr. Singers in 1967. They started playing in the church where their mother was a preacher and father a deacon, and toured by van around the South.

And on Friday, the Browns are releasing "Searching," their first batch of new songs in nearly 50 years, and gearing up for a tour in July to the Roskilde festival in Denmark as well as the Netherlands, Slovakia, and Germany.

"It's a blessing," Brown Caldwell said. "It feels good. We are getting older and it seems the Lord just now is blessing our youth like it's brand new again."

Their resurgence began with a record collector who stumbled on their first single in a Midwest thrift store and bought it for \$1.

Greg Belson, whose gospel collection fills three rooms in Los Angeles, was intrigued that the band's name was so similar to The Staple Singers. He put "We Got a Race to Run" on a portable turntable he often brings with him, and was struck by their sound: "It sat completely in the wheelhouse of what I look for, which is specifically gospel with a soulful tinge, rather than what I would say more classical church-based gospel," Belson said.

Yale Eveley, the president of Luaka Bop, heard Belson's radio show and pulled from his collection for a compilation of 1970s gospel soul songs called "The Time

A world-weariness comes through in songs like the lead track, "Living In This World Alone," with Brown Caldwell mother and tries to "live free from sin" without her.

"I can listen to their voices and hear the stories that they're talking about and really understand at reissuing "When Do We Get them," Gallab said. "That's the one thing that's really sets them apart, especially when Annie sings. She's just telling you a story."

The band members — now four generations of the Brown family shrug off their newfound celebrity. On the latest record, R.C. plays guitar and the two other siblings sing. Edward's son sings backing vocals, R.C.'s son plays bass and R.C.'s grandson plays drums.


They still live in Aberdeen, a town of 5,000 along the Tombigbee River where they grew up and where Edward and R.C. retired from factory jobs. All three insist their mission remains the same as it was all those years ago to spread the word of God and inspire listeners to follow his path.

Edward Brown said he rarely hears anything good on the radio anymore and worries about younger generations turning to gun violence. So he is doing his part by singing and trying to "touch people" with his life story.


"You have to do what God said do," he said. "When I hit the stage, I tell the Lord, 'take self out, You take over.' I just give it all to him and do what he wants me to do."

# 'THIS IS GOING TO BE PAINFUL': How a bold AI device flopped

SAN FRANCISCO — Days before gadget reviewers weighed in on the Humane Ai Pin, a futuristic wearable device powered by artificial intelligence, the founders of the company gathered their employees and encouraged them to brace themselves. The reviews might be disappointing, they warned.

Humane's founders, Bethany Bongiorno and Imran Chaudhri, were right. In April, reviewers brutally panned the new \$699 product, which Humane had marketed for a year with ads and at glitzy events such as Paris Fashion Week. The Ai Pin was "totally broken" and had "glaring flaws," some reviewers said. One declared it "the worst product I've ever reviewed."

About a week after the reviews came out, Humane started talking to HP, a computer and printer company, about selling itself for more than \$1 billion, three people with knowledge of the conversations said. Other potential buyers have emerged, although talks have been casual and no formal sales process

has begun. Humane retained Tidal Partners, an investment bank, to help navigate the discussions while also managing a new funding round that would value it at \$1.1 billion, three people with knowledge of the plans said.

The developments amount to a face-plant by Humane, which had positioned itself as a top contender among a wave of AI hardware makers. The San Francisco company had raised \$240 million from powerful Silicon Valley investors, and Salesforce CEO Marc Benjoff. who valued the startup at \$1 billion based on its enormous ambition and promise. Humane spent five vears building a device to disrupt the smartphone — only to founder.

As of early April, Humane had received about 10.000 orders for the Ai Pin, a small fraction of the 100,000 that it hoped to sell this year, two people familiar with its sales said. In recent months, the company has also grappled with employee departures and changed a return policy to address canceled orders. sale. On Wednesday, it asked customers to stop using the Ai Pin charging case because of a fire risk associated with its battery.

Its setbacks are part of a pattern of stumbles across the world of generative AI as companies release software engineer was dismissed unpolished products. In an interview, Bongiorno and Chaudhri, who are married, declined to comment on a possible sale or fundraising for Humane. They said their ambitions for the Ai Pin had not changed, but they acknowledged that there was a difference between testing a device and actually using it.

You don't know everything including OpenAI CEO Sam Altman before you launch," Bongiorno said. Given the product reviews, Chaudhri said, they "definitely wish that we were able to resolve some of nose things a little bit differently."

HP didn't respond to requests for

comment. This account of Humane is based on interviews with 23 current and former employees, advisers and investors, who requested anonymity because they were not authorized to speak publicly about the matter or feared retaliation. Bloomberg earlier reported on the startup's potential

Chaudhri and Bongiorno, who both worked at Apple, started Humane in 2019. They set out to create a lapel pin that clips to clothing with a magnet. The device gives users access to an AI-powered virtual assistant that can send messages. search the web or take photos. It is complemented by a laser that projects text onto the palm of a user's hand for tasks such as skipping a song while playing music. It also has a camera, a speaker and cellular service.

From the beginning, current and former employees said, the Ai Pin had issues, which reviewers later

picked apart. One was the device's laser display, which consumed tremendous power and would cause the pin to overheat. Before showing the gadget to prospective partners and investors. Humane executives often chilled it on ice packs so it would last longer, three people familiar with the demonstrations said. Those employees said such measures could be common early in a product development cycle.

When employees expressed concerns about the heat, they said, Humane's founders replied that software improvements reducing power use would fix it. Chaudhri, who led design, wanted to keep the gadget's

sleek design, three people said.

The device's battery was not big enough to last long. Test units ran out of power within hours, current and former employees said. Humane decided to provide customers with a backup battery and charging case, which increased the product's price more than \$100, two employees said.

The problems contributed to Humane's pushing back the date when it would ship the device to April from October, employees said.

Some employees tried persuading the founders not to launch the Ai Pin because it wasn't ready, three people said. Others repeatedly asked them to hire a head of marketing. The role remained vacant before the product's release.

In October, Time magazine named the Ai Pin one of the best inventions of 2023. The next month. Humane revealed the product's details, promoting it in commercials.

But orders were slower than expected, three people said, leading Humane to reduce plans to produce more of the devices. Bongiorno declined to comment on sales.

In January, Humane laid off about 10 employees. A month later, a senior software engineer was let go after she questioned whether the Ai Pin would be ready by April. In a company meeting after the dismissal, Chaudhri and Bongiorno said the employee had violated policy by talking negatively about Humane, two attendees said.

Bongiorno said the company couldn't comment on individual

employees.

The founders said they had spoken with several reviewers as they evaluated the device and responded to questions about their experiences, which included concerns about the Ai Pin's temperature and inaccurate responses to some requests.

On April 11, reviews in The New York Times, The Wall Street Journal and The Verge blasted the Ai Pin's shortcomings. Marques Brownlee, a tech reviewer on YouTube with 19 million subscribers, headlined his review "The Worst Product I've Ever Reviewed ... for Now."

After the reviews, Bongiorno said, "we pulled the team together, and we said, 'OK, look, this is going to be painful. We're going to have to lean into painful feedback.

Bongiorno and Chaudhri said Humane had since worked on the device's issues. The startup has added more voice navigation options to the device, as well as sound effects, to make it easier to use. The updates include integrating OpenAI's newest chatbot system, GPT-40, and one that is set to improve battery life by 25% and cut the device's response time to two

Those updates have addressed the questions raised by reviewers, the founders said. Bongiorno referred to the reviews and feedback as "a gift that we've been given."

Businesses are interested in the device, she added. Within 48 hours of its launch, more than 1,000 companies — including in retail, medicine and education — reached out to discuss potentially working together or building software for the pin, Bongiorno said.

Humane also signed wireless carrier deals to expand the Ai Pin to South Korea and Japan.

Some discussions, including with HP, turned into talks about a potential sale, as well as licensing Humane's technology, three people with knowledge of the situation said. The conversations led Chaudhri and Bongiorno to hire Tidal Partners, which had advised Cisco on its recent \$28 billion acquisition of cybersecurity business Splunk.

Those talks have continued as Humane dealt with its discovery that a battery supplier had provided components that could pose a fire risk. On Wednesday, it asked customers to stop using their charging case accessory while it worked to find a new vendor.

Humane had enough money to release its device, people close to the company said, but was trying to raise more.

"We just want to build," Bongior-

Chaudhri added, "We have to look at how best we fund that."



# The NBA nurtures its hoop dreams in Africa

On an outdoor basketball court surrounded by seashell-scattered sand last month, a man coached a group of teenage girls through a drill. The staccato pounding of their dribbles alternated in the hot air with a tinnier sound in the distance: men hammering nails into wood while a bleating white billy goat looked on.

The coach, Abibou Sall, 34, instructed his players to dribble along the sideline, first with their left hands, then their right. Don't look down at the ball, he told them, wanting the girls to learn to trust

Sall is a physical trainer for the Pikine Basket Club, which practices at the Jacques Chirac Center. About 600 children play basketball at this recreational center in Pikine, a suburb bordering Dakar. The youngest players, ages 6 to 7, are introduced to the game on mini hoops. The oldest are 18. Sall is also a die-hard fan of the NBA.

"I am passionate, I watch every game," Sall said. "I never sleep," he added jok-

It is a picture that would delight the NBA — a devotee of its league teaching basketball to youngsters on a continent in which it sees tremendous economic

The NBA has been promoting basketball in Africa for more than 20 years, pouring hundreds of millions of dollars has in China, while also tapping into the rich talent pool on the continent.

Much of the league's work is concentrated in Senegal, where it operates an academy for high-school-age players, an NBA Africa office and the headquarters of the Basketball Africa League. NBA Africa's investors include former NBA players and former President Barack Obama. The Basketball Africa League, or BAL, was announced in 2019 with FIBA, the sport's international governing body. Its first season was in 2021.

Although NBA Africa is not yet profitable, the investment seems to be producing results. Soccer may still be the king of sports on the continent, but basketball is

throughout Africa play on local club teams and in after-school programs. The NBA has generated goodwill by building courts, libraries and homes; administering basketball camps and other development programs; and supporting gender equality. But some wonder about whether the support needed for basketball to flourish can be sustained.

"As much as we are investing in Africa, the opportunity is so enormous I worry that we're under investing," Adam Silver, the NBA commissioner, said in an interview. "There's so much opportunity, but it's not always easy to know how to deploy capital, which government you should be dealing with, who the honest brokers are. And so we're learning as we go."

Today, about 10% of NBA players are either African or have at least one parent from Africa. A vast majority of its players are African American.

The league is also conscious of population growth figures, which say that by 2050, 1 in 4 people on the planet will be

The league's first African office opened in Johannesburg in 2010. Eleven years later, a second was opened in Dakar, followed by others in Lagos, Nigeria; Cairo; and Nairobi, Kenya. Investors and strategic partners including Obama were tapped in 2021 to help make NBA Africa a stand-alone entity that operated its offices and the BAL.

Luol Deng, who played at Duke University and then spent 15 seasons in the NBA, was among the former players who invested. Deng, 39, was born in what is now South Sudan and fled with his family to Egypt as a child. He is the president of South Sudan's basketball federation, which earned Africa's automatic qualifying berth to this year's Summer Olympics in Paris.

On a recent evening, Deng was in Dakar Arena, watching as the stands filled up with fans before a BAL game.

"I went from being a refugee in Egypt, never seen a basketball game, to being in the NBA," he said. "So now imagine becoming increasingly popular. People for these kids. This is in their backyard."

With the BAL, the NBA accomplished something it couldn't do in China: help establish a league that it could operate. The 12 teams in the league play in three conferences, which include the six champions from leagues in Angola, Egypt, Nigeria, Rwanda, Senegal and Tunisia. Six teams earned their spots this year through a qualifying tournament. Seeding games were played in Pretoria, South Africa; Cairo; and Dakar, with eight teams advancing to the playoffs in Kigali, Rwanda.

Amadou Gallo Fall, the president of the BAL, hopes that the league can one day become one of the best in the world. "We believe that when kids are exposed to basketball, if they have access, they'll love it," he said.

The NBA's first official event on the continent was a Basketball Without Borders camp for teenagers in 2003. The league has since held Jr. NBA programs for younger children in 19 African countries and opened its NBA Academy in Senegal for elite high-school-age players from the continent.

"I've made a lot of friends, brothers, these guys here in the academy," said Khaman Maluach, a 7-foot-2 center who will play for Duke University in North Carolina next season. "It's very special."

Silver said that it would be "a while" before the NBA's ventures in Africa Beyond money, the NBA emphasized were profitable, and that the league was behind on its projections, in part because the BAL's start was constrained by the coronavirus pandemic. But he said the league was achieving attendance and viewership goals.

And the NBA's footprint does seem to be growing in Africa.

Aziz Sy, 34, grew up in Dakar and runs a business incubator. He started following the NBA as a child. As he watches companies and foreign governments try to establish themselves in Africa, he worries that some of them aren't thinking enough about the challenges African people face.

The NBA, in his mind, has been different. "They've really come in and tried to understand the country, understand the people," he said.
